- Mail Delivery. In November, we met with regional US Post Office officials to discuss ongoing issues with mail delivery in Douglas Park. It was a lively meeting, to say the least! At April's meeting, postal officials including recently-appointed South Station manger Station Manager, Marcus Clinkscale—will return for more discussion and feedback. A thank-you to Douglas Park resident Carol Freysinger for coordinating with the USPS folks!
- Neighborhood Conservation. We will discuss and vote on our next project to submit to the Neighborhood Conservation queue. Under consideration are:

# COLUMBIA PIKE UTILITY UNDERGROUNDING AND STREETSCAPE IMPROVEMENTS

Final cleanup of the long-standing reconstruction of the West End of Columbia Pike between South Wakefield Street and South Four Mile Run Drive continues.

### 12TH ST S STREETLIGHTING

This Neighborhood Conservation project to install streetlights along S 12th St from S Quincy St to S Monroe St received approval at the December Neighborhood Conservation Advisory Committee (NCAC) meeting and is anticipated to be approved by the County Board this month. Construction is anticipated for later in 2015. Many thanks to S Monroe St resident Andrew Johnson for shepherding this project.

### 12TH ST S IMPROVEMENTS

The current top-priority Neighborhood Conservation project to install streetlights, sidewalks and curb-and-gutter along S 12th St from S Glebe Rd to S Walter Reed Dr has seen some activity of late; a group of residents and DPCA officers met with Neighborhood Conservation staff in March to review the project site. A detailed scope of work is in progress and the initial petition drive in the project area should be coming later this spring.

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# Randolph News

# READ ACROSS ARLINGTON (DIGITAL LEARNING DAY PROJECT)

Read Across Arlington, is a technology based, cross-county project with a literacy focus. On Friday, March 13, the students from Randolph Elementary and Jamestown Elementary embarked on a shared Digital Learning Day journey. With an aim to enhance their knowledge of and comfort with digital resources, 94 students converged on the Randolph library. They were sorted into pairs – one student from Randolph, one student from Jamestown - and participated in getting-to-know-you exercises. Then they progressed to the work at hand – to write and illustrate their own e-books and eventually, upload those books to a digital library.

The students were introduced to the concept of ebooks by listening to the *Diary of the Teachers*, an e-book based on the book/template, *Diary of a Worm*, but customized to tell the stories of the 2nd grade teachers. Employing the BookWriter app, the students tackled the cover page, dedication page, and about the author. They worked closely with their partners and helped each other understand the requirements and the process. After a pizza lunch and a joint recess, which served to further strengthen the new relationships, friends said goodbye and the Jamestown students headed home.

The following week, students continued to work on their books, adding content and journal entries, refining, editing and creating illustrations using the DrawingPad app and finally doing voice recordings. In addition, on two different occasions, the students from the two schools Skyped with each other, reviewing progress and asking questions about the project.

On Tuesday, March 24, Randolph students visited Jamestown to finish the undertaking and have a celebration. The finale included personal reflections, and a presentation of the completed books with the opportunity for students to read each other's e-books. All of the completed books are stored on an i-bookshelf and available for others to access. See pictures from this event on this page and the next.

Randolph Elementary's short film, Helping Hands, Willing Hearts, was awarded an Honorable Mention at the White House Student Film Festival 2015, The Impact of Giving Back. 
