# New Leadership at Randolph Elementary

DR DONNA SNYDER APPOINTED PRINCIPAL FOR A TWO-YEAR TERM

**O**n 18 August, the Arlington School Board appointed Dr Donna Snyder to a two-year interim assignment as the principal of Randolph Elementary school. The two-year appointment allows the community time to more fully assess and define the features they are seeking in the permanent principal position. That inventory of skills and abilities will then help inform the position description and job vacancy announcement that will be advertised during the 2017-18 school year for the permanent principal who will come on board in time for Fall 2018.

#### **ABOUT DR SNYDER**

Dr Snyder began her professional career in Montgomery County, MD where she served as an elementary teacher, curriculum specialist, and elementary school principal. She led a Title I school which served 850 students, ranging in age from infants through 6th grade. While in Montgomery County, she also served as an adjunct professor at both Johns Hopkins and Bowie State Universities. After relocating to Florida, she held the position of elementary supervisor in Hillsborough County, Florida, the 6th largest school system in the USA. In that capacity, she was responsible for the instructional delivery of elementary curriculum for 14,000 students. After relocating to Northern Virginia, Dr Snyder was appointed the Title I Supervisor for Arlington Public Schools (APS), serving as the division director for all school improvement initiatives throughout the school system.

the Arlington County Zoning Administrator for an fter our June Meeting, the DPCA board contacted investigation and ruling on the appropriateness of the use of the property by the County. On 22 July, the Zoning Administrator informed DPCA that, in her opinion, the use was non-compliant. On 10 August, Arlington Water, Sewer and Streets / Department of Environmental Services (WSS/DES) filed a special use permit application with the Zoning division. The Executive Committee of the Douglas Park Civic Association agreed to challenge the application and said challenge was filed with the Zoning Division on 6 September. It is expected that should the process continue, the permit will come before the County Board in October or November. This year's Election Day Bake Sale will once again be held at the Randolph Elementary School polling site. As always, the money raised from the sale will go to help fund neighborhood activities. Since this is one of our primary fund-raising mechanisms aside from neighborhood association dues, we ask for your involvement and support in one or more of the following ways:

#### **Baking**

Baked items that typically sell well include cakes (whole or quarters), pies, sweet and quick breads (regular and mini-loaves), savory breads, cookies or brownies (with or without nuts clearly labeled), fruit



bars, fudge, scones, biscotti and so forth. Cupcakes, though trendy, are sometimes more difficult to wrap and handle; however, if you can find a way to make them manageable, we will welcome those also. If you are able to wrap your items in clear plastic, or bag them individually (large brownies) or as small groups (several cookies) in baggies, it is very helpful though not required. The drop-off point for baked goods will be the enclosed front porch at 1701 South Nelson Street, where volunteers will be wrapping and pricing items on the evening before the sale. Collection of items begins at 5p and continues until 9p that evening, Monday 7 November. You may also bring items directly to the bake sale table on the morning of Election Day.

We will be seeking people to work two-hour shifts at the bake sale table throughout the day on Tuesday 4 November. The bake sale table will be open from 6a to 7p.

Some agents do not bother to do this. We work **endlessly** for the seller and subsequent **buyers**. We try to be as THOROUGH as we possibly can be.

In 2011, she was appointed as the interim principal to begin the revitalization process of Hoffman-Boston Elementary School. Under her leadership, the school demonstrated significant academic gains and became poised to become a STEM school for 2012-2013. Until her most recent appointment, Dr Snyder served as the APS Director of Early Childhood and Elementary Education.

Outside of public education, Dr Snyder has also held leadership positions. She served for eight years as the Chief Education Officer for an educational organization where she was responsible for designing, implementing and evaluating K-16 educational programs, high quality professional learning and program evaluation. In this capacity, she had direct oversight of educational programs for 45,000 students annually. She also was responsible for creating professional advisory boards and strategic partnerships with professional associations, universities, school systems and community agencies.

Dr Snyder earned a bachelor's degree in elementary education and a master's degree in school administration and curriculum development. She received her Ed.D. in curriculum and instruction from Virginia Tech.
