project. In November, Campbell & Ferrara will complete three improvements to the school grounds, including:

- a new split-rail fence around the parking lot entrance and butterfly garden
- a new mulch & timber walkway to help direct students and parents off of the grassy areas,
- and a long hedge that will help define the front grounds and also keep students and parents on designated sidewalks and paths.

Our longer-term plan also includes new plantings in the butterfly garden; additional shrubbery around the school; rebuilding the timber retaining wall by door #10; and smaller plantings to enhance the look of the grounds.

We are engaging the Randolph community in assisting with plantings and providing some ongoing maintenance of the grounds. We hope that the Douglas Park community also will support these improvements to our neighborhood school. The Randolph PTA is contributing funds from our reserves to support the first phase of work. We also have secured a small grant from the County Council of PTAs to support this effort. And the school has identified some funds to support phase one. But we will need to raise additional money to fully implement the project.

The Douglas Park Civic Association is providing matching funds for any donations made by community members to this project. We invite and encourage you to support the Randolph landscaping project with a *tax-deductible* gift to the Randolph PTA. DPCA will match gifts made between now and November 30, 2017, up to a total of \$2,500.

Musical Happenings Douglas Park Native Makes Her DC Musical Debut November 21st at Walter Reed Community Center

The Walter Reed Community Center is home to the Arlington Acoustic Café. The Café takes place in the fall and spring on the third Tuesday of the month. The next one, on November 21, features Melanie Wiggins, who grew up in Douglas Park and is now making her home in Brooklyn, NY.

Melanie and Sara Horton are an indie folk duo called Hearth. They sing and play their quirky, soulful songs about everything from the vagaries of love in the time of frat-bros and nice-guys to inequality and immigration reform -- all delivered with an Indigo Girls meets Simon & Garfunkel meets Kimya Dawson meets something-youhaven't-quite-heard-yet sound. Also on the bill is Windward Passage, a guitar-flute-clarinet instrumental trio. They perform pop, rock, classical, folk, show tunes and more.

Flutist Susan Bour retired after 20 years with the President's Own United States Marine Band. Guitarist Phil Bour was a guest artist for the Foggy Bottom Band and is accomplished in jazz improvisation. Clarinetist Michael Knight retired from The United States Army Band "Pershing's Own" after 35 years of service, 10 of which he held the position of Concertmaster. He currently performs as principal clarinetist with the American Balalaika Symphony and The Virginia Grand Military Band.

Now for the thanks - these neighbors did a remarkable job and I know I will miss a few so if you know any I missed lease let me know and I'll send it out.

One of the greatest things about this neighborhood is that all you have to do is invite folks over to your house - serve a libation and give everyone a general idea of what we'd like to happen - and guess what? Just stand back and watch!

First off we have to thank Bret Alexander for building and repairing all the large, realistic and amazing props you saw on the trail - these props have lasted 4 years being stored under decks and in neighborhood garages. Bret also designed the posters we used for advertising.

Additionally, Rachel Staley, Laine Bowen (Art teachers at Randolph) and their students completely repaired the Witch's Cauldron.

Louise Mitchell got the posters printed and Rebecca Krafft coordinated all the advertising (in addition to them dressing up a really scary people on Saturday night.)

Ben Sutton, in a side of him I didn't know - recruited Zombie volunteers aged from 11 to 30+ and made them rehearse a zombie walk, applied temporary scars and choreographed the first section of the trail complete with fog machines and lights. I also know his PTA president wife was out there on Saturday but sorry Bethany - I didn't see you!

Cyndi Jackson was the official Douglas Park female version of Bella Lugosi(

In Cyndi's full moon addicted group were Bruce and Elaine Nystrom who not only haunted that part of the trail but Bruce helped get our posters out to all the Libraries and Elaine made it through the night after taking a big spill on Friday - which thank goodness only resulted in bruises - which added to her vampire makeup.

Back to the Witch's Cauldron - Ben and Cyndi had to go out and really put the hard sell on volunteers to be Zombies and Vampires but Kristin Francis and Traci Pietra had witches from the neighborhood falling out of trees - well, that doesn't sound quite right - let's just say they had a lot of volunteers - of all ages - the kids even volunteered to be "cooked" for a while if they could then "help out scaring people as witches" - remarkable. Our new neighbor Rob Wall took on all the technology for broadcasting the creepy music - did a test run the day before and brought all the sound equipment!

Geeti Bawa did all our liaison work with AFAC, got all the donation boxes and worked the AFAC table.
