Thank You Douglas Park for Another Successful Holiday Fund Drive

Thanks to all of you, the Douglas Park Civic Association Holiday Fund Drive, was a tremendous success again this year. This program, which has been going strong for close to 25 years and is an integral part of DPCA annual activities, gives a hand to needy families at Randolph Elementary School. Each year DPCA works with the counselor and teachers at the school to identify students/ families who are in financial need. Neighbors generously contribute their time, money and efforts to help these families.

This year, in the hopes of reaching more children, we did things a little differently. Instead of adopting entire families, we focused on the children at the school and any younger siblings at home. We reached over 60 children, ages 2 months – 10 years old. Parents had the opportunity to fill out wish lists for their children; we asked them to provide "wants" and "needs," and we tried to make sure that all children received one of each. Lots of kids received shoes, boots or sneakers. They also opened packages of warm clothes, diapers, pants and socks. The "fun" items included soccer balls, Legos, unicorns (hopefully not real ones!), dolls, a stuffed bear, and (my favorite) a karaoke machine. We also purchased \$500 worth of Giant gift cards to be given out to families as needed.



Growing Plants for Your Garden

Now is the time to start thinking of what vegetables, herbs and flowers you may want to plant in your yard or garden this year. If you are feeling adventurous, you can start some of your own in your home. You get a much better selection of varieties if you grow your own plants. I start my tomatoes, herbs and flowers in early to mid-March. The seed packets will tell you the time frame for planting indoors.

The biggest roadblock in growing seedlings is the lack of good light. Light from a sunny window is normally not adequate for stocky and healthy plants. An inexpensive source of good light is to use 48" fluorescent shop lights hung from chains from a shelf. I hang about 3 shop lights from a portable system made from ³/₄" PVC pipe that can be taken apart and stored when not in use.

When starting seeds, it is best to use seed starting soil in your cell packs or peat pots and have a clear cover over them to keep in moisture. Many stores sell kits for starting seeds. For good seed germination, make sure the soil is warm either by using a special seed starting heating mat or you can use the top of your water heater or any other warm place. Once the seeds are up, they do not need the warm soil but do need moisture, good air circulation so they do not rot, and good light. Now is the time to use your lighting system. The light should be about 3" from the top of the seedlings during the growing process. Keep raising the light as the plants grow. If the light is too far away, the plants will be weak and spindly. I have my lights on timers from 6:00 am to 10:00 pm. To encourage thick stems, you can brush them gently or blow on them to make them sway. Take the clear cover off when the seedlings touch it.

Once you see the roots coming out of the seed pots you will need to transplant them to larger containers. Once the weather warms and before you can plant them outside the plants will need to be hardened. The biggest peril to them is the wind and too much sun. A week or two before planting put them out on a porch or some other sheltered place to get them used to the elements. Gradually put them out in the sun. You may have to cover them if there is a chance of frost.

Enjoy the fruits of your labor and happy gardening.
