Barcroft Apartments

Duilt in sections between 1939 and 1952, Barcroft Apartments on D Columbia Pike, George Mason and Four Mile Run Drives in our Douglas Park neighborhood was for years the largest market-rate affordable apartment complex in Arlington with 1,334 units. The Columbia Pike community has long known that Barcroft Apartments could be suddenly sold by its owners, the DeLashmutt family, and without protections in place, a new owner could raze every apartment building and build nothing but townhouses.

As a result, Barcroft Apartments was very much on the minds of the community and Arlington County planners when we began the Columbia Pike Neighborhoods Plan adopted by the Arlington County Board in 2012. One of our major goals was to figure out how to save 6,200 units of affordable housing along the Columbia Pike corridor and Barcroft Apartments was a key focus of the Neighborhoods Form Based Code, adopted by the County Board in 2013, that was developed from the Neighborhoods Plan. Now protections were in place.

When Jair Lynch Real Estate Partners purchased Barcroft Apartments in late 2021, they committed to preserve all 1,334 units as Committed Affordable Units (CAFs) for 99 years at 60% of the Area Median Income (AMI). In 2023, 60% of the AMI for a family of four was \$90,420.

Jair Lynch intends to rehab and update all apartments in phases, having divided the entire complex into sections. Last year, Jair Lynch presented their plans for buildings at the northwest corner of George Mason and Four Mile Run Drives and for buildings in the easternmost "triangle" on Four Mile Run Drive to the Form Based Code Advisory Working Group (FBC AWG). (Every civic association along the Columbia Pike corridor has a representative at the AWG.) Their plans include installing washer/dryer units in every apartment, constructing "bump outs" on some two bedroom apartments to create three and four bedroom units, converting several units to Americans with Disabilities Act accessible apartments with accessible parking spaces, and, since building laundry rooms will no longer be needed, possibly repurposing them for indoor bicycle storage. While each building is being rehabbed, residents will be able to move into vacant apartments within the complex in an effort to keep the disruption to people's lives as low and as short as possible.

Under the Neighborhoods Form Based Code, Jair Lynch will be able to build new mixed-income developments on some edges of the property - for example, the SE corner of Columbia Pike and George Mason Drive. They want to have businesses and services that are appealing to current and new residents and spaces that will welcome the larger Columbia Pike community.

ire Station #9, the only Fire Station in the Douglas Park neighborhood, has one of only two Heavy Rescue Squads in Arlington. This unit has many responsibilities, one of which is vehicle stabilization and extrication. For probably over a decade this station has had vehicles come and go for the firefighters assigned here to train and practice on. Part of the training involves

vehicles on their sides and roofs to simulate what is experienced in the field. All fluids are drained from the vehicles before they are turned over to minimize the environmental impact.
