#### THE CIVIC ASSOCIATION NEEDS YOU!

The civic association is the primary voice for our neighborhood with the county government, on everything from use permits for businesses in our neighborhood to revitalization of Columbia Pike. We also throw some pretty good parties, like the Fourth of July Parade and Picnic and the Winter Dance Fest. We need your participation through our very reasonable dues (\$10) to support the organization financially. Please rejoin, join and contribute.

#### HIGHLAND STREET REALIGNMENT

Re-Alignment of Highland Street at the corner of Columbia Pike (currently between Dunkin Donuts and the Days Inn (Rincome) is part of the Form Based Code adopted several years ago with the active support of Douglas Park. The realignment would move the intersection to line up with Highland Street on the north side of the Pike. This would require displacing the frame shop business in that spot currently.

The reason for the realignment is to make the intersection safer for both pedestrians and cars, to be a standard street grid. The current intersection is chaotic. We also need to look into the future to the six story buildings that will some day occupy these spots. We want the traffic from these buildings to move directly to and from the Pike, rather than through the residential streets of Douglas Park (12th Street or the planned 11th Street). Moving a street is a major endeavor, and likely to be expensive, as it would require either a developer or the county to acquire the sites where the street would run. But in the long run (50 years or more), it is the right thing to do.

Efforts are gearing up to determine how to proceed with this intersection. We will bring you more news on this issue as it develops.

#### JEFFERSON MIDDLE SCHOOL AUTHORIZED BY INTERNATIONAL BACCALAUREATE ORGANIZATION

Jefferson Middle School, which serves the Douglas Park neighborhood, has been authorized for the Middle Years Program by the prestigious International Baccalaureate Organization. This organization applies rigorous standards to ensure the quality of instruction in the IB program, which concentrates on inquiry based learning, and understanding of our place in the world. Students not only learn, they learn skills of inquiry and analysis—how to learn. The focus on our place in the international community is especially important as our world becomes smaller, and is particularly appropriate for our diverse community. (Randolph Elementary (right in the heart of Douglas Park, is Arlington's only Primary Years IB school.) Congratulations to the Jefferson faculty, administrators and students!

The Columbia Pike Revitalization Organization celebrated its 20th Anniversary with a celebration at the Arlington Cinema and Drafthouse. Douglas Park residents Linda Dye, Reid Goldstein, Rebecca Krafft and Chris Zimmerman were honored for their years of service and leadership in revitalizing the Pike. Many thanks to each, as we start to see new developments coming off the drawing table and coming out of the ground.

#### FOUR MILE RUN DRIVE IMPROVEMENTS.

At the most recent civic association meeting, the county transportation staff showed us preliminary designs for improvements to Four Mile Run Drive between Columbia Pike and George Mason Drive. The sidewalk along the west side of the main artery would be improved (the side by the condo's), with marked cross walks added in three spots to ease crossing to the bike path and to the other spur of Four Mile Run Drive (for commuters catching buses on the



Pike). Sidewalks would be expanded at the George Mason intersection for additional pedestrian safety. Parking lanes would be dedicated along Four Mile Run Drive (away from the intersections) to provide precious on-street parking, and to slow traffic. The civic association pointed out that streetlights along the sidewalks on both spurs of Four Mile Run Drive are needed, and expressed the hope that pedestrianonly crossing could be worked into the signals at George Mason and the Pike for the bike path. The path becomes a major thoroughfare on weekends. Plans are preliminary and the civic association will be following this project with great interest.

#### SMALL PARKS GRANT

Douglas Park will be the beneficiary of a Small Parks Grant to be used to locate, mark and erect an historical marker for the graveyards in Douglas Park. You did not know there are graveyards in Douglas Park? That is exactly why we are undertaking this effort. Thanks to the county, the Parks Commissioners and our resident historian, Andy Johnson, and to our parks committee leader, Marty Nielson.

#### HIGHLAND STREET TRAFFIC CIRCLE

Thanks to Kiersten Stadler for taking the lead in getting plantings for the traffic circle at Highland St. and 13th St. This forlorn circle is in need of some hardy but attractive plantings, and the county is now moving toward getting them planted.

#### WALTER REED CROSSING

Thanks to Allison Rosa for taking the lead on trying to get a pedestrian crossing of Walter Reed Drive in the vicinity of the Fire Station (so we can walk to Nauck and Drew School). We don't have anything on the drawing board yet, but Allison is making progress.

#### SPEAKING OF CROSSINGS...

Implementation of the light for a pedestrian crossing of Glebe at 12th Street is underway. We hope to see construction in the next few months.

Crossings of Glebe at 14th and 16th are being studied by the traffic engineers. A crossing of Walter Reed at 12th Street is part of the bikeway planned to be parallel to the Pike, and with construction of the Halstead at Arlington (Walter Reed and the Pike, where the big hole is now) there will be a traffic signal at the new 11th Street (next to BB&T bank). It is going to be easier and safer to walk around the neighborhood.

# Fort Barnard Dog Park Lighting Update

Since December 2005, members of Douglas Dogs have worked with Arlington County Parks and Recreation Department to acquire lights for the Fort Barnard Dog Park. Last summer, a community-wide survey was conducted which showed overwhelming support for the seasonal lighting and for the dog park in general. 241 surveys were received with 96 percent supporting the lighting project.

Douglas Dogs conducted private fundraising efforts by selling T-shirts and hooded sweatshirts, collecting direct contributions, and holding a community BBQ in October 2006. Douglas Dogs also received a \$12,000 Parks Enhancement Grant from Arlington County. All our hard work has paid off since the Ft Barnard lighting project was approved by Arlington County Board on February 24, 2007.

Low-cost, efficient lights will be installed this summer. The lights will be used during the winter months when natural lighting is not available in the late afternoon and evening. The lights will be on a timer with an auto-shut off controlled by Arlington County Parks and Recreation Department.

#### COMMUNITY OUTREACH

In September 2006, Douglas Dogs formed a team and raised money for the Humane Society Walk for the Animals as the DP Peeps. In December 2006, thanks to members and friends, Douglas Elves delivered over \$500 in toys and funds to Arlington County Fire Station 9 on Walter Reed Drive for the Toys for Tots campaign. The toys nearly filled up the front entry.
