## **Columbia Pike Housing Study**

The County Board has just initiated a process to study housing conditions along Columbia Pike, with a particular focus on preservation of affordable housing. This could be a significant issue for Douglas Park, as we have about 2,300 units of affordable housing in our neighborhood. These include the Oakland Apartments near Oakland Street and the Pike, Westmont Gardens, along the Pike between Oakland and Quincy; Quebec Gardens, between Quincy and Four Mile Run Drive; and the Barcroft Apartments, which is among the largest apartment complexes in the county. Barcroft Apartments include about 1400 units, most between George Mason Drive, Four Mile Run Drive and Columbia Pike. Several building are also along George Mason Drive, 16th Street and Four Mile Run Drive on the east side of George Mason Drive. The housing study will also look at similar areas all along the Pike.

First, we need to understand what is NOT happening with the housing study. There are no plans within the county to make any changes to any policies at this time. The idea of the study is to get ahead of events—to understand what we would like to see, and our options, before a property owner or developer decides to re-develop a complex. If we have a plan, we have a better chance of influencing new development to our liking. But while there are no current plans for changes in county housing policy, that is what the study is about. One of the main questions for the study is whether there should be changes in policies as they affect housing on Columbia Pike.

At this time, we are not aware of any plans by apartment complex owners to re-develop or make changes to their properties within Douglas Park. Quebec Apartments was recently refurbished and the majority of its units are committed to be affordable under the terms of the financing and approval of the county. Virginia Gardens (on Taylor Street, off of 16th) is also committed affordable. But the private owners of the other apartments could change their plans.

There are no plans to change any areas of single family homes or to convert single family areas to apartments. Rather, in setting up the study, the only areas included are areas of multi-family apartments (and some townhouses across the Pike from Douglas Park). Still, we need to understand that changes in one part of the neighborhood can affect the quality of life in other parts of the neighborhood.

No decisions have been made about whether the housing study will recommend particular policies to maintain and continued on page 2

promote affordable housing. But there is a broad consensus in the Arlington community, the County government, and on the County Board that affordable housing should be maintained in general. Since most of the affordable housing in Arlington is along the Pike, it will be the focus of preservation efforts. Preservation of affordable housing is also stated as a goal in the County Board resolution setting up the study.

The housing study will be conducted by County staff, with help from outside consultants, and will be guided by a group of representatives of every neighborhood along the Pike. Douglas Park Civic Association will definitely be represented on the group, and we will ensure that the interests or our neighborhood are heard. We expect the housing study to take up to two years.

The study gives us a lot to think about. There is very strong support for affordable housing in our community, as demonstrated by the work our community has already done to maintain and promote affordable housing. But if changes in policy or in zoning are needed to maintain or promote affordable housing, such changes could have an impact on our community. Stay tuned.

## Neighborhood Conservation Plan

It is time for us to update our neighborhood conservation plan. What's that? A neighborhood conservation plan is a plan developed by the neighborhood and submitted to the county to lay out our vision of what we want our neighborhood to be like. It will describe what we would like to see in new development, if any, things we would like to preserve, and improvements we would like to see to improve the quality of life. We pull together the information; we write it; it is about us and where we live.

We need help! Debbie Falco has agreed to help with the effort, but we also need help from other folks. We will need to put together a survey, asking each resident about things that may affect the neighborhood, changes we would like to see, etc. We then need to compile the results and develop recommendations based on what the survey responses say. Then we need to make sure that the neighborhood agrees with the recommendations, and write it all up in a single document. It sounds like work. It is.

But this is very important work. First of all, it helps us understand a consensus on our long term plan for the neighborhood. Second, the county government really pays attention to these plans when they are making plans for the broader community. "What does the neighborhood conservation plan say?" is a common question for county planners. And third, these plans are necessary to keep getting funding for things like sidewalks and streetlights.
