NEW WEEKDAY ART 77 SERVICE BEGAN JUNE 8TH

Arlington Rapid Transit (ART) has begun a new bus service to Clarendon, Court House and Shirlington running along Walter Reed Drive. The new ART 77 buses run every thirty minutes, Monday through Friday, from Shirlington, up Walter Reed Drive to 6th Street South (near Patrick Henry School) where they cut over to Washington Boulevard for the ride to Clarendon and Wilson Boulevards and the Clarendon and Court House Metro stations. CELEBRATE THE PIKE'S 200TH BIRTHDAY

The company formed to build Columbia Pike was chartered by Congress in 1810, so the Pike's 200th birthday is coming up next year. Plans are in the works to celebrate the history of the Pike and the neighborhoods around it. Did you know that the Pike started as a toll road to the Virginia border? (Our neighborhood was part of the District of Columbia then.) Did you know that Freedman's Village, a community of emancipated people, was established on Columbia Pike? That a garrison of German-speaking soldiers (recent immigrants) who built two forts located in Douglas Park lived at Glebe Road and Columbia Pike during the Civil War? Do you recall the W&OD Railroad (path of the bike trail along Four Mile Run Drive) that crossed the Pike near the bridge over Four Mile Run?

There is a huge amount of history to be learned (and taught) about the Pike community. We want to gather up all the historical information we can, including all the historical information you may have that is not widely published, and your personal history, from old photos to particular memories. We want to collect this information and make it available to everyone, so people can understand the rich history of our community. And we want to celebrate!

A Pike 200 History Committee has just been formed. More details about the effort will be coming out in the next few months. 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Real Estate Market Trends

For the local Northern VA & DC area, buyer traffic has increased as affordability improves; with entry level housing seeing the majority of activity. April increased with the traffic index improving to 66 from 54 in March (readings greater than 50 suggest traffic above expectations). Extremely low interest rates and lower prices are driving sales. Buyers are making the best of home prices, and many affordable properties are receiving multiple offers, especially Bank Owned and Short Sale listings. The \$8,000 first time homebuyer tax credit is also spurring traffic levels, especially at the lower end. Movement in the upper price ranges is still slower. Sellers are becoming increasingly realistic with their pricing, and are seeing price cuts to better match those of most recent sales in the last 90 days. Inventory levels have stabilized and in some markets there is a shortage of good housing stock. Home prices continued their decline in April but were less broad-based than in prior months, indicating sequentially lower home prices.

Appraisals continue to be an issue, with many coming in lower than expected which is derailing some transactions, or causing sellers to drop their prices to appraised value. While mortgage rates are at or below 5% for conforming, FHA and VA loans, new underwriting criteria and appraisal rules are creating huge challenges for all parties involved in residential housing sales.

As of May 1st, all lenders are operating on the new appraisal law passed by Fannie Mae and Freddie Mac. The **Home**Valuation Code of Conduct (HVCC)

now requires that Appraisals must be ordered through an approved national appraisal company selected by each lender. The national appraisal companies choose a random appraiser within an area to conduct the appraisal. This applies to ALL conventional transactions.

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June is Adopt-a-Cat Month

Animal Welfare League of Arlington Has Extended Hours Sat, June 20 and Some Free Adoptions

The Animal Welfare League of Arlington in conjunction with the American Humane Association sponsors Adopt-a-Cat Month each year in June to draw attention to the millions of cats that come into animal shelters every year. Since kittens are usually born in the warmer months, summer is always crowded in our cat room. Both adult cats and kittens are available for adoption. The Animal Welfare League of Arlington will have extended hours to 8.00 pm on Saturday, June 20 for cat adoptions in addition to their regular hours. There is no adoption fee for cats at least five (5) years of age. Reasons to adopt a cat include:

Having a cat fights depression and loneliness.

Cats are entertaining to watch and fun to play with.

Cats provide companionship and affection.

Cats are independent and can be left alone while you're at work.

Cats are comfortable in small spaces like apartments.

Cats are very clean; they bathe themselves!

You can play with your cat while lying on the sofa; no need for walks in the rain.

Cats are easy to house train, especially adult cats, who are probably already house trained.

Indoor, spayed/neutered cats live long lives, providing up to 20 years of companionship.

Lots of cats need good homes; when you adopt one, you're helping to solve the problem!

You might want to keep these numbers handy. If you see something going on in the neighborhood that looks suspicious, give the police a call at the non-emergency number, 703.558.2222. We have a safe neighborhood, but paying attention to what is going on can make it even safer.

If you have a public service issue, (recycling bin, trash pickup?) or see a problem in the street (pothole, broken water main, etc.) give the Department of Environmental Services a call at 703.228.6570. That number is a clearinghouse for the various services.

Columbia Pike Land Use and Housing Study - Now On-going!

In January 1998, the County Board announced the creation of the Columbia Pike Initiative (CPI). Through an extensive community process, a new long-range vision and plan was adopted in March 2002 called the 'Columbia Pike Initiative: A Revitalization Plan' and updated in 2005. This new vision revisits and celebrates the more traditional urban 'Main Street' environment.

As a follow-up recommendation in the updated CPI Plan (2005), the second planning phase will study the residential areas along the Pike that were not included in the first phase of the plan. The CPIPlan (2005) described the Housing Initiative as one that would enhance the quality of life by improving and expanding housing options through a housing revitalization plan that emphasizes implementation and development strategies. Now, with anticipated market adjustments and redevelopment activities in the Revitalization District, the County anticipates likely change and higher demands on these residential properties. The purpose of this planning study is to anticipate, affect, and manage that change. Further purposes of this study would be to:

- Develop a plan that includes a new vision that coincides with the community's housing goals and complement the County's efforts to enhance the quality of life along the corridor with an emphasis on affordable housing preservation and opportunities for revitalization and redevelopment for targeted areas;
- Develop and or improve a housing stock that is diverse in housing type as well as affordability for individuals, seniors, and families; and
- Develop a plan that is compatible with and builds on the adopted vision for the commercial nodes and the future streetcar along the corridor;
- Developaplanthatencouragesmixed-use,infilldevelopment adjacent to Columbia Pike to promote walkability and use of the future transit; and
- Identify new and/or existing tools and incentives to help implement this new vision.

The geographic focus of the study would be concentrated on the areas within the civic association boundaries within the Columbia Pike Planning Area. The study would also include the neighborhood known as Foxcroft Heights on the eastern end of Columbia Pike.

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The Columbia Pike Land Use and Housing Study will be conducted in phases:

• Phase 1a: Planning for the Plan

This first phase is primarily the preliminary work conducted by County Staff to commence the study of the residential areas of the Columbia Pike corridor.

• Phase 1b: Economic Analysis

During this phase, County Staff and consultants will examine issues and identify opportunities and constraints. An economic analysis will then be conducted on various development scenarios for achieving community and County housing objectives, including the use of density and other housing and economic incentives.

• Phase 2: Visioning and Urban Design/Plan Development

This phase will take the recommendations of the Economic Study and develop alternative scenarios of what the 'development envelope' could physically look like.

• Phase 3: Implementation

After the adoption of the Columbia Pike Residential Plan, County Staff would then develop the tools needed to implement the vision and recommendations of the Plan with the assistance of the consultants.
