THE DOUGLAS PARK FOURTH OF JULY PICNIC IS COMING!

At 10.30am the parade will start, passing through the neighborhood and throngs of onlookers, down South Nelson Street to 18th Street South to South Quincy Street to Douglas Park, where the picnic will begin.

- Wakefield High School. Construction is expected to start in July and be completed in August 2013. The new building will be built where the baseball and softball fields are now. When it is done, the old building will be torn down.
- Bicycle Boulevards. This is the name for the effort to provide safer bicycle travel along routes parallel to the Pike, using 12th Street South on the south (Douglas Park) side and 9th South Street on the north side. Plans are to put in a traffic signal at 12th Street South and George Mason Drive (at the Barcroft Apartments and bottom of the Doctor's Run Park path up to Randolph School). This signal could be activated by pedestrians or bicyclists to help them get across George Mason. The light at 12th and Glebe by the Post Office would serve the same purpose. A new pedestrian/bicyclist activated light would also be put on Walter Reed at 12th. The plans we have seen for the intersection at Walter Reed are probably overdone, and would restrict vehicle turns there. We are working with county staff to make sure vehicles can co-exist safely there with bicycles without interfering with traffic circulation in that area, since 12th Street is the only connection through to Columbia Heights (the neighborhood on the other side of Walter Reed) in that immediate area. Stopping cut through traffic, slowing down cars, and dealing with the very poor sight lines at the Highland Street and 12th Street intersection are also priorities. When updated plans are available, they will be posted on the Douglas Park website.

PROJECT DESIGN CHARETTE TO BE HELD 24-30 JUNE

■he Columbia Pike Land Use and Housing Study is coming to an important step later this month. Representatives of the Pike neighborhoods, county staff and consultants have been meeting for months talking about what we would like to see in the future of the residential areas along the Pike, to guide future re-development of the multi-family apartment complexes, if and when someone decides to re-develop. (The plan is to leave the single family home areas alone, but obviously changes to the adjacent apartments can make a big difference.) Part of the Arlington Way is to have a plan for development before there is a pending proposal, so that the residents and county government set the agenda, not a developer. Plans have already been developed for the commercial areas along the Pike, and we see them starting to come to fruition in the Halstead Building on Walter Reed Drive and the Pike, and Penrose Square (site of the former and future Giant Food store), and other projects.

The next step for the residential areas is to turn concepts and goals into pictures and plans. That effort will continue in a design charrette starting June 24. It is time to get specific. If we want pedestrian access in particular areas, where will it go? If want some retail in this area where would it go? How much open space and where? All these things can be designed, block by block, just as the community did years ago for the commercial areas

One of the major goals of this effort is preservation of affordable housing. One of the major "tools" for affordable housing preservation is to add density (bigger buildings). To make a project financially viable, it is often, if not usually, necessary to add more apartments, so the developer (including non-profits) can afford to build or renovate apartments at affordable rents. Often many of the apartments in a project will be at market rates, so there is enough overall rent coming from a project so that the rest of the apartments can be offered at the lower, affordable rents. Getting all these new units on a piece of land usually means adding more density (more units) in the same space. There seems to be a consensus on the general goal of preserving affordable housing. And adding density is commonly used to

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make such efforts viable. So the question is: "how much is too much?"

We can't answer that question with a mathematical formula or pages of rules, because it depends so much on where additional density would be constructed, and what it looks like, and how parking is managed, and so many other design and architecture questions. Size of a building is important, but placement is equally important in how it affects the surrounding area. Done right, a larger building can be more pleasant than the smaller building it replaces. To figure this out, you just have to sit down and draw it. That is what the upcoming charrette is all about. The residents—this means you—county staff and consultants are going to sit down and draw out what these areas should look like.

The effort is to be guided by these draft goals:

- 1. Foster a healthy, diverse community with high quality of life along the Pike.
- 2. Stabilize and strengthen single-family and multi-family neighborhoods and support established concepts of vibrant, economically-strong mixed-use commercial centers.
- 3. Improve existing housing stock and expand housing options to achieve a housing mix that serves diverse households, preserves affordability for current and future residents, and supports the adopted Housing Goals and Targets and the CP Initiative.

- 4. Create a safe, pedestrian-friendly and multi-modal corridor with attractive and tree-lined streetscapes and seamless linkages between neighborhoods, to the commercial centers, and to the region.
- 5. Preserve neighborhood character, historic buildings and tree canopy.
- 6. Enhance urban design and architectural features to improve the Pike identity and maintain compatible transitions between the neighborhoods and commercial centers.
- 7. Incorporate sustainable, energy efficient "green" neighborhood and building design principals.

The affordable housing preservation goals are no net loss housing units affordable for families earning 60% of the area median income, and no net loss of more than 50% of the units affordable for families at 80% of the area median income. The definition works this way: if the median area income is \$100,000 per year, a family of four making \$60,000 per year would be able to afford 30% of that for rent, which is \$18,000 or \$1,500 per month. Other particular goals are also included.

DOUGLAS PARK STUDENT WINS INTERNATIONAL SCIENCE FAIR AWARD

Douglas Park's own Catie Mitchell, along with her project partner Andrea Green, received a 4th place award in Environmental Sciences at the Intel International Science and Engineering Fair, held May 8-13 in Los Angeles, CA. The pair's project was titled *The Toxicity of Bioremediation Agents*.

To qualify for the International Science and Engineering Fair, Catie and Andrea first won Best In Fair at the Northern Virginia Science Fair in March, followed by a second place award in the Virginia State Science and Engineering Fair in April. Both students are sophomores at HB Woodlawn.

This year, more than 1,500 young entrepreneurs, innovators and scientists were selected to compete in the Intel International Science and Engineering Fair, the world's largest high school science research competition. They were selected from 443 affiliate fairs in 65 countries, regions and territories.
