President's Corner

NEXT CIVIC ASSOCIATION MEETING

The next civic association meeting will be Tuesday 17 September at 7.3 opm in the downstairs meeting room of Firehouse No. 9 at 19th Street South and South Walter Reed Drive. On the agenda:

- The new 11th Street South. Capital One Bank has agreed to a Use Permit Amendment that in conjunction with the construction of Pike 3400 (the old Rosenthal Chevrolet property) will allow the completion of 11th Street South between South Glebe Road and South Monroe Street. While the Association approves of the street construction and appreciates Capital One's cooperation in this regard, we are concerned that County staff has proposed that the 11th Street South connections with Monroe and Glebe be 'driveway' style connections rather than standard intersections. County staff feels that the intersections will improve pedestrian safety; the Association's concern is that the awkward intersections will serve to force commercial traffic deeper into residential neighborhoods as the Pike develops. The County Board is currently scheduled to review the Amendment application on Saturday 21 September.
- Candidates for the 49th District of the Virginia House of Delegates. We will hand over some time to the two candidates for this November's 49th Virginia House district elections: incumbent Democrat Alfonso Lopez and challenger Terrence 'Terry' Modglin of the Independent Green party. We will not be conducting a debate; rather we will allow each candidate fifteen minutes for remarks then allow for ten minutes of questions from the audience.





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LAST CIVIC ASSOCIATION MEETING, TUESDAY 18 JUNE

Association meeting on Tuesday evening 18 June at Firehouse 9. The agenda included:

- Christin Jolicouer, Watershed Planner; Greg Emanuel, Director of Arlington DES and other DES staff presented an update on the 16th St South 'Green Streets' project. We also heard from residents on 16th St South affected by the project. Afterwards, Civic Association attendees discussed the presentations and expressed numerous concerns with the project. A consensus emerged to have the Civic Association formally communicate those concerns to the County Board and DES staff. The Civic Association communicated those concerns and the County subsequently agreed to de-link the 'Green Streets' project from the previously approved trafficcalming project on 16th St South and revisit the 'Green Streets' project itself.
- John Snyder, Immediate Past-President of DPCA, updated us on plans for the 31st Douglas Fourth of July Park Parade and Picnic. See the front cover for pictures of this event.
- Adam Henderson was elected President of the Civic Association.

OTHER NEIGHBORHOOD UPDATES:

Arlington Mill Community Center and Senior Center

The new Arlington Mill Community Center and Senior Center at 909 South Dinwiddie St (at the Pike, just across Four Mile Run from Douglas Park) had a 'soft' opening on Tuesday 3 September. The formal ribbon-cutting on the facility will be Saturday 21 September from 5pm to 7pm. The ceremony will include remarks from the County Board, a sneak peek of the center's programs, light refreshments, an opportunity to sign up for classes at the center, live music and more! The community is invited to attend.

The new Community Center offers numerous amenities including a fitness room and full-size gymnasium, a teaching and preparation kitchen, Project Family, Early Headstart and senior nutrition program areas on the plaza level. On the Dinwiddie Street level is the gameroom, shared areas for youth, teen and senior programs, the community living room with public access computers and the new Pan American Bakery shop (opening in November). Visual arts, fitness, community outreach, clinic and computer skills training programs are on the top level of the center. There are a total of four multipurpose rooms and five classrooms and wireless internet access throughout.

The accompanying Arlington Mill Residences, a 122-unit affordable housing apartment block connected to the new community center, is under construction and scheduled for occupancy in January 2014. For more details on the new facility,

COLUMBIA PIKE UNDERGROUNDING AND STREET IMPROVEMENTS

Construction for the utility undergrounding is nearly complete from South Wakefield Street to South Four Mile Run Drive. Over the next couple of months, Dominion Virginia Power, Verizon and Comcast will pull new underground lines to make required power connections and remove existing utility poles. The County's contractor is moving forward with the street improvement phase, which includes realignment of South Four Mile Run Minor, wider sidewalks, street trees and street lights. In August, crews permanently relocated the Columbia Pike westbound bus stop to east of South Buchanan Street.

Crews may perform some of this work during evening hours to minimize the impact to businesses and motorists. Residents can expect some construction noise associated with this work. The County appreciates your patience during this time! Businesses located along Columbia Pike remain open during construction and owners greatly appreciate the community's continuing support. Completion of this project is anticipated by the end of 2013.

OTHER NEIGHBORHOOD UPDATES (CTD): BIKE BOULEVARDS

To provide safe and convenient bike routes along the Pike, Arlington County has been creating two bike boulevards parallel to Columbia Pike on low-volume and low-speed (25 MPH) streets. Over the past few months, the County began placing street markings and signs on the 9th Street S. and 12th Street S. side of the bike boulevards. Staff are currently designing updated curbs, medians, ADA-compliant ramps, sidewalk re-alignments and a HAWK (High-intensity Activated crossWalK) signal. Following this design phase, the project team will meet with the community to discuss these new features.

DOCTORS RUN TRAIL IMPROVEMENTS

The Civic Association recently signed off on plans for improvements to Doctors Run Trail behind Randolph Elementary School. The plan is essentially the same as presented at the 30 April 2013 Civic Association meeting, with the exception that the stairs behind Randolph school have been replaced by a sloping trail. The project will soon go out to bid. Construction is expected to begin in early 2014 with a completion date in Summer 2014. We are still in discussions with the County and Randolph parents'

organizations regarding the lighting plan. It is hoped that that plan will be finalized before years' end.

SUPER STOPS

The County is conducting a comprehensive review of the performance, cost, design and construction of the recently completed Walter Reed Super Stop prototype. The goal of the review is to facilitate the construction of the remaining 23 planned stops faster, more cost effectively and with improved functionality. Over seven hundred Super Stop users and Columbia Pike neighbors contributed opinions through an online survey, which closed on 21 July. This feedback will be used by County staff to thoroughly evaluate the prototype's physical elements. The final comprehensive review is slated for completion in early 2014.

Arlington Transit is introducing a new SmarTrip® card that will make it easier for middle and high school students to get around. The Student iRide SmarTrip® card lets teens ride ART buses for a discounted fare of 75 cents. The card also works on Metrobus, Metrorail and other regional bus systems that accept SmarTrip®, but the student discount only applies to ART buses.

Why Get One?

- **It Saves Money.** ART bus rides only cost 75¢ with the card
- It's Easy. It's just like a regular SmarTrip® card that works on Metrobus, Metrorail, ART and other buses.
- It's Convenient. You don't have to worry about carrying cash or buying a paper Metrorail pass.

Only middle and high school students who attend school in Arlington can use the card. The student must be present at the time of purchase and show their student ID (or other form of ID). The card will expire on the student's 19th birthday.

Calling All Bakers ELECTION DAY FUNDRAISER PLANNING BEGINS

This year's Election Day Bake Sale will once again be held at the Randolph School polling site. As always, the money raised from the sale will go to help fund our annual July 4th parade and picnic. Since this is a key fundraiser (along with newsletter advertising and neighborhood association dues) we ask for your involvement and support in the following ways:

- Baking. Baked items that typically sell well include cakes (whole or quarters), pies, sweet and quick breads (regular and mini loaves), savory breads, cookies or brownies (with and without nuts, clearly labeled), fruit bars, fudge, scones, biscotti and so forth. Cupcakes, though trendy, are sometimes more difficult to wrap and handle; however, if you can find a way to make them manageable (covered) we will welcome those, too. If you are able to wrap your items in clear plastic, or bag them individually (large brownies) or as small groups (several cookies) in baggies, it is very helpful though not required. The drop-off point for baked goods will be the enclosed front porch at 1701 South Nelson Street, where we will be wrapping and pricing items on the evening before the sale. Collection of items goes from 4p to 8p the evening of Monday4 November.
- **Volunteering Your Time.** We will be seeking people to work two hour shifts at the bake sale table throughout the day on Tuesday 5 November; hours from 6a to 7p.
- **Buying Baked Goods.** If you don't have time or the inclination to bake, plan to buy what others bake. Take goodies into the office that day, or stock your freezer for the upcoming holiday season! We will also be selling coffee, tea and hot chocolate at the table. If voting lines are long we will try to have line service for hot drinks (this depends on the number of volunteers available).
- **Donations.** If you don't bake, and you don't want to bring the calories into your house, you can always donate to the cause directly.

Please email (*dpdunbars@comcast.net*) or call me (*703.271.5335*), beginning in October, with any baking pledges. The more specific you can be about what you will bake, the better I can advise others who ask me what's needed. I will begin making phone calls to folks on my baking list in mid October, but I will try to avoid calling if I've already heard from you.
