SPECIAL MEETING THU 23 OCT AT 7.30P TO DISCUSS THE POSSIBLE ADDITION TO RANDOLPH ELEMENTARY SCHOOL

Two joint events with other South Arlington Associations also upcoming

Arlington Public Schools (APS) is currently reviewing locations for additional elementary school seats in South Arlington. A working group commissioned by the County Board is currently gathering input towards a recommendation on whether to construct a new elementary school at the Thomas Jefferson Middle School (TJMS) site. The School Board has recently identified Barcroft and Randolph Elementary schools as preferred expansion candidates should the school at TJMS fail to be approved. John Chadwick, APS Assistant Superintendent for Facilities and Operations will join us to discuss the possible expansion plans at a special meeting of the Civic Association to be held Thursday evening 23 October at 7.30p in the Randolph Elementary School cafeteria.

UPCOMING JOINT EVENTS WITH OTHER SOUTH ARLINGTON CIVIC ASSOCIATIONS

DPCA will be participating in two joint events with other South Arlington Civic Associations over the next few weeks. We invite residents of Douglas Park to attend these two important events:

- **County Board candidates' forum sponsored by the Barcroft School and Civic League and the Douglas Park and Columbia Heights West Civic Associations.** Thursday 2 October from 7.30–9p at Walter Reed Community Center, 2909 16th Street South in Multi-purpose rooms B and C. Incumbent Independent John Vihstadt and Democratic challenger Alan Howze will address issues of importance to South Arlington.
- **A joint meeting between the Barcroft School and Civic League and Douglas Park Civic Association to discuss a proposed Form-Based Code development at the NE corner**



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of South Buchanan Street and Columbia Pike. Thursday 6 November from 7.30-9p at Barcroft Community House, 800 South Buchanan Street. The preliminary proposal is for a four-storey multi-purpose building with 8000 sq ft of ground floor retail and 78 residential units. The project will have below-grade parking.

NEXT REGULAR MEETING: MAIL SERVICE IN DOUGLAS PARK

Our next regular Civic Association meeting will be the week of 17 November 2014. We are currently working with USPS to arrange an appearance by Postal Service officials to address the ongoing concerns with the mail service in Douglas Park. Final details, including meeting date and location, will be announced on the Douglas Park listserv and in the November *Neighbor News*.

NEIGHBORHOOD UPDATES:

- **Bike Boulevards.** Arlington County's effort to create 'Bike Boulevards' paralleling Columbia Pike by installing improvements along 9th, 11th, 12th and 13th Streets South continues. Recently, work was completed on a narrowed crossing of South Quincy Street at 12th Street South. A new HAWK signal will also be placed at South George Mason Drive and 13th Street South.

NEIGHBORHOOD UPDATES (CTD)

The Douglas Park Civic Association's objections to the portion of the Bike Boulevard between South Glebe Road and South Walter Reed Drive due to ongoing pedestrian, cyclist and motorist safety issues in the corridor have been recognized and included in the recently adopted ten-year Capital Improvement Plan. We will be meeting with County Board members and County staff in early October to discuss the next steps in solving this issue.

- **Traffic Changes near Randolph Elementary School.** The changes in traffic flow near Randolph Elementary School that were discussed at our June meeting are on hold pending completion of the water line work along South Quincy Street. Look for these changes later this autumn:
 - Two to three additional student loading and unloading spaces along South Quincy Street.
 - Updated school warning signage and 'End School Zone' signs along South Quincy Street.
 - School crosswalk signage at 13th Street South and 14th Street South.

- 'No U-Turn' signage at South Quincy Street and 14th Street South.
- Turn restrictions during arrival (8-8.30a) and dismissal (3-3.30p) at the intersection of South Quincy Street and 14th Street South.

Doctors Run Trail Upgrade and Pathlighting

Work is underway on this project to replace the section of Doctors Run Trail from Randolph Elementary to South George Mason Drive. New LED pathlighting will also be installed. Arlington Public Works now states that they expect work to be 'substantially complete' by the end of October. 1700 South Quincy Street

The property at 1700 South Quincy Street was purchased by the County earlier this summer. Since that time, the buildings on the site have been demolished and the lot converted to open space as a future addition to Douglas Park.

NEWS FROM PATRICK HENRY ELEMENTARY

School is back in session! We are excited to welcome 519 students at Patrick Henry this fall. We ended last year with 462 students, so this is a significant increase for us. There are many new faces among the staff as well as we've opened up new classes to accommodate the increased enrollment. All of the staff are prepared and excited to begin a new year.

Over the summer, the PTA worked hard to revamp and revitalize our outdoor learning space. We've added tables so that teachers can hold class outside and so that we can continue to have children learn about the environment through our Exemplary Project—the Outdoor Habitat. The Habitat itself also received a facelift and the kids are so excited to be able to use this amazing space! We are always looking for volunteers to help us maintain our outdoor learning space. We are excited to launch a new program this year, *Henry Community Giving*. This program is geared towards directly helping families in our community, and also coordinating a community of giving within Patrick Henry. The fund will be administered through Henry's social worker, Elizabeth Auten (elizabeth.auten@apsva.us)

and counselor (erin.upton@apsva.us) and is geared to providing emergency support for families in need of things like reading glasses, coats, backpacks and other necessary items. The PTA has provided some seed funding and welcomes donations from our community to supplement these funds. Donations can be sent to the Patrick Henry PTA through the school main office.

Over the next few months, look for your Henry neighbors to be talking about our 2d Annual Read-a-thon. Our fall fundraiser is geared towards encouraging kids to read, read, read! Kids are asked to set a reading goal over the 15-day reading period and record minutes devoted to reading every night. All kids are encouraged to record minutes and turn in their forms; prizes are based on participation as well as fundraising.

Look for your favorite superhero, ghost or goblin during our annual Hallowe'en walk. This is one of the most fun community events. All of our kids are invited to walk as we make our way through the Penrose neighborhood with the band from Thomas Jefferson Middle School. The walk hopes to raise awareness and funds for the Doorways program. Many of kids dress up and it's a lot of fun to wave to neighbors as we pass by.

ANNUAL EVENT AT RANDOLPH SCHOOL ON TUESDAY 4 NOVEMBER

This year's Election Day Bake Sale will once again be held at the Randolph Elementary School polling site. As always, the money raised from the sale will go to help fund our annual Fourth of July Parade and Picnic. Since this is our primary fund-raising mechanism aside from neighborhood association dues, we ask for your involvement and support in one or more of the following ways:

Baking

Baked items that typically sell well include cakes (whole or quarters), pies, sweet and quick breads (regular and mini-loaves), savory breads, cookies or brownies (with or without nuts clearly labeled), fruit bars, fudge, scones, biscotti and so forth. Cupcakes, though trendy, are sometimes more difficult to wrap and handle; however, if you can find a way to make them manageable, we will welcome those also. If you are able to wrap your items in clear plastic, or bag them individually (large brownies) or as small groups (several cookies) in baggies, it is very helpful though not required.



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The drop-off point for baked goods will be the enclosed front porch at 1701 South Nelson Street, where volunteers will be wrapping and pricing items on the evening before the sale. Collection of items begins at 5p and continues until 9p that evening, Monday 3 November. You may also bring items directly to the bake sale table on the morning of Election Day.

Volunteering Your Time

We will be seeking people to work two-hour shifts at the bake sale table throughout the day on Tuesday 4 November. The bake sale table will be open from 6a to 7p.

Buying Baked Goods

If you don't have time or the inclination to bake, plan to buy what others bake! Take goodies into the office that day, or stock your freezer for the upcoming holiday season! We will also be selling coffee, tea and hot chocolate at the table.

Donations

If you don't bake, and you don't want to bring the calories into your house, you can always donate to the cause directly.

It has been my observation over the years that this neighborhood has some fabulous bakers as well as wonderful eaters of baked goods! We've done very well with this event in past years and we hope for continued involvement and success in our fundraising efforts. 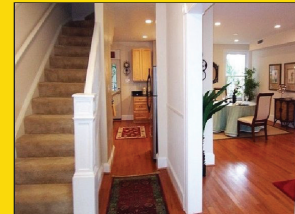
